# READING EXPECTATIONS END OF YEAR 8



#### **IDEAS**

- Identify and understand the main ideas in complex texts
- Example Question: What is the main idea of this article?/ What is the theme of this poem?
- Find details in the text that support the main idea
- Example Question: What details in the article show the effects of rising sea levels?

## **INFERENCE**

- Understand the implicit meanings and identify language features that give the reader these clues
- Example Answer: The author seems concerned about climate change, as indicated by the urgent tone and emphasis on negative impacts

#### **VOCABULARY**

- Understand and use advanced vocabulary
- Example Question: What does the word 'mitigate' mean in this article?

### **SUMMARISE**

- Tell the main points of the text succinctly. Answer should include who, what, where, when and how
- Identify and use key words in your summary
- Example Summary: The article discusses how climate change is causing sea levels to rise, leading to increased flooding and erosion in coastal areas

### **EVALUATE**

- Compare and evaluate information from multiple sources
- Example Answer: Both articles discuss the impact of climate change, but this one focuses more on coastal communities, while the other discusses global effects

### **PREDICT**

- Make predictions about what may happen next and give reasons using personal knowledge or clues in the text
- Example Question: From the author's perspective, what do you think will happen if no action is taken on cliimate change?

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### READ FOR PURPOSE

- Read texts for various purposes, such as research, analysis, and enjoyment
- Example: Reading a historical document to understand past events or a novel for leisure

### **FLUENCY**

- Read complex texts smoothly and with appropriate expression
- Example: Able to read a paragraph aloud with intonation and pauses for commas and full stops

### FEATURES OF GENRE

- Students should recognise different genres like fiction, non-fiction, poetry and drama and their unique features
- Example: Knowing that "1984" is a dystopian novel and understanding its themes of surveillance and control
- Understand the features of genre
- Example: Identifying the use of symbolism in a poem or the structure of a scientific report

### SUSTAINED READING

- Read and comprehend longer, more complex texts independently
- Example: Reading "Holes" by Louis Sacher or 'The Lightning Thief' by Rick Riordan and discussing the main events, characters and themes

### FEATURES OF TEXT

- Recognise and understand things like headings, diagrams and captions
- Example: Interpreting graphs and charts in non-fiction texts and understand how they add meaning

## CRITICAL THINKING

- Think about what you read and ask questions
- Identify different ways a text may be interpreted
- Identify the author's purpose of writing the text and how they used language features to achieve this
- Compare and contrast similar texts and identify shared themes
- Identify how your thinking changed after reading the text
